Compiled by Steve Smith 1st Person Seminars Higher Education Consulting, LLC **The** *28*th *Annual West Virginia Great Teachers Seminar* (**WVGTS**) was conducted virtually August 3-5, 2020. 1st Person Seminars Higher Education Consulting, LLC assisted in the development of this statewide professional learning event for West Virginia teaching faculty. In lieu of cancelling the WVGTS, this year's seminar was virtually created, designed, and executed by the 7-member seminar staff in approximately 10 weeks after North Bend State Park (sole venue for the seminar) closed its doors in May 2020 due to pandemic concerns. The WVGTS continues to be financially supported by the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission (WVHEPC -- *http://www.wvhepc.edu/*) with additional support from the West Virginia Community & Technical College System (WVCTCS -- http://www.wvctcs.org/) and *without* commercial or outside business vendors or interests.

SEMINAR LEADERS AND PARTICIPANTS

The current WVGTS Staff remains one of the most experienced and veteran GTS leadership groups in North America. After leading West Virginia's Great Teachers Seminar for 25 years, David Gottshall, founder of the Great Teacher movement retired in 2017 and passed on WVGTS leadership to **Steve Smith**. Longtime understudy to David, Steve sustained the North Carolina GTS for many years and currently maintains the <u>National Great Teachers Movement</u> (NGTM) website.

Staff facilitators (pictured below) are usually "graduates" of previous WV Great Teachers Seminars and this year included **Mark Goldstein** (*formerly at WVNCC*), **Fred Jacoby** (*formerly at WVU Potomac State*), **Cat Hayes** (*formerly at WVSOM*), **Deidre Morrison** (*formerly at Blue Ridge CTC*), **David Wohl** (*College of Charleston and Winthrop U / formerly at WV State*), and **Barbara Ladner** (*WV State*).

SEMINAR PURPOSE

- To celebrate good teaching.
- To challenge educators to venture beyond the limits of their own specializations and environments in search of transferable ideas and the universals of teaching.
- To promote a spirit of introspection and self-appraisal by providing a relaxed setting and straightforward process whereby participants can seriously review and contemplate their attitudes, methods and behaviors as teachers.
- To practice rational analysis of instructional problems and to develop realistic and creative approaches to their solutions.
- To stimulate the exchange of information and ideas by building an expanding state-wide network of communication among teachers in higher education.

- 1. Model effective practices in online instruction through our "converted" seminar format
- Provide a space that will become FULL of useable ideas right out of the box! Things you can use by Monday.... Wednesday at the latest.




Participant/Staff Combined Years of Teaching Experience (The "Collective Expert")

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SCHEDULE AND ACTIVITIES

The seminar launched Monday morning with an overview of the entire seminar process including participant and leadership expectations. Seminar staff reviewed the mechanisms in place for seminar communications and support in the event participants had any questions or needed help during the event itself. Some of these topics included Getting Students Committed to/Using APA7 or Their Field's Manual, Increasing Student Willingness to Ask for Personal Help in Online Courses, and Testing Online—Concerns About Avoiding Cheating.



General Session SEVEN - Zoom

This final segment of our seminar included closing remarks by the seminar leadership in addition to participants engaging in the WVGTS final exam. This process included participants being placed back into their original small grouping to complete the final exam question: "Working with a small group of your peers, by whatever means, help us understand the nature of the Great Teacher". Seminar closure consisted of each original, small group making presentations on the nature of "The Great Teacher"—all of which were profound representations of the art and spirit of teaching. The final closing "circle" gave each person an opportunity to express what he or she was taking home from the seminar!
