DATE AND FORMAT

The 29th Annual West Virginia Great Teachers Seminar (WVGTS) was conducted August 2-3, 2021. This was the second year in a row that the seminar was held virtually because of the COVID-19 Pandemic. The WVGTS continues to be financially supported by the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission (WVHEPC -- http://www.wvhepc.edu/) with additional support from the West Virginia Community & Technical College System (WVCTCS -- https://www.wvctcs.org/) and without commercial or outside business vendors or interests.

SEMINAR LEADERS

The current WVGTS Staff remains one of the most experienced and veteran GTS leadership groups in North America.

The seminar was led by **Dr. David Wohl** (Professor and Dean Emeritus, Winthrop University and formerly at WV State U) and facilitated by **Mark Goldstein** (formerly at WVNCC), **Cat Hayes** (formerly at WVSOM), **David Wohl** (College of and **Barbara Ladner** (WV State U) and **Steve Smith** (former director of the North Carolina GTS and longtime understudy to David Gottshall, founder of the Great Teacher Movement.)

SEMINAR PURPOSE

- To celebrate good teaching.
- To challenge educators to venture beyond the limits of their own specializations and environments in search of transferable ideas and the universals of teaching.
- To promote a spirit of introspection and self-appraisal by providing a relaxed setting and straightforward process whereby participants can seriously review and contemplate their attitudes, methods and behaviors as teachers.
- To practice rational analysis of instructional problems and to developrealistic and creative approaches to their solutions.
- To stimulate the exchange of information and ideas by building an expanding state-wide network of communication among teachers in higher education.

THE TWO PRIMARY GOALS OF THE SEMINAR

- 1. Model effective practices in online instruction through our "converted" seminar format
- 2. Provide a space that will become FULL of useable ideas right out of the box! Things you can use by Monday.... Wednesday at the latest.

DEMOGRAPHICS & OTHER RELEVANT DATA

Twenty-four (24) faculty members representing sixteen colleges/universities participated in the Seminar. The range of experience included first year faculty to those with over 30 years of experience. Disciplines from all areas of higher education were represented including: Accounting, Business, Finance, Automotive Technology, Business Technology, Creative Arts Therapy, Economics, Education, Entrepreneurship, Environmental Science, Criminal Justice, Mathematics/Math Education, Geography, Graphic Design, Medicine, Legal Studies, Nursing, Pharmacy, Theatre, and Physical Therapy.
